The Foley City Council held a regular meeting on April 7, 2020, at 5:30 p.m. at the Foley City Hall.

The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Motion by Swanson, seconded by Musachio, to approve the agenda. Swanson – aye, Brosh – aye, Musachio – aye, Bettendorf – aye. Motion carried, unanimous.

Consent Agenda

Motion by Brosh, seconded by Swanson, to approve the consent agenda, which includes the following:

Public Hearing – Liquor Licenses

Mayor Bettendorf recessed the regular meeting at 5:33 p.m. to conduct public hearing on the Coborn's & Little Dukes 3.2 liquor licenses. No one spoke. Department Reports

Mayor Bettendorf indicated written report were provided and asked for questions. Brosh asked about damage being done to 75th Street and staff indicated they will be following up. Gondeck asked McMillin about the part-time backgrounding process and McMillin indicated it is on hold until

fingerprinting is opened back up at the county. McMillin also outlined scheduling plans if staff were to become ill. There was also discussion on the golf course and street maintenance.

There was discussion on if the pool should open and how it will be handled. The council agreed to appoint Mayor Bettendorf to work with staff to make any decisions on how to move forward with the pool. Musachio requested the entire council be consulted if there would be any significant revenue issues.

Old Business

Brunn indicated she is still in contact with the lobbyists and will be reaching out to councilmembers on what they can be doing to help with the project.

New Business

The council discussed the flag disposal project and indicated support to move forward. Gondeck asked if there should also be one added at the new memorial.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 450

COMPENSATION OF MAYOR AND COUNCILMEMBER

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOLEY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

That the 1974 Code of Ordinances, of the City of Foley, be amended by substituting therefore the following wording in Section 110:00 to read as follows:

Changes are underlined.

Section 110 – Compensation of Mayor and Councilmembers

Section 110:00. Compensation.

For each regular and special meeting of the City Council, which the Mayor attends, the Mayor shall receive a salary of \$150.00. For each regular and special meeting the City Councilmember attends, those Councilmembers in attendance shall receive a salary of \$150.00.

Section 110:02 Additonal Compensation

For non-regularly scheduled meetings or training conferences requiring travel outside the Foley City limits and/or requiring a time-commitment of a half-day or more, the Mayor and Councilmembers shall be compensated a rate of \$75 per half-day or \$150 per day plus mileage.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after January 1, 2021.

Sarah,

Your online research question was forwarded to my attention.

From just an insurance point of view, there are not any particular issues.

If the city were to get sued over a decision related to the pool including any alleged bodily injury related to that decision, the city would be covered. In other words, LMCIT would defend the city as well as any employees and officials named in the lawsuit and pay any damages that might be awarded. The claim would be subject to the city's deductible. Also, a claim could affect the city's experience rating and future premiums.

In defending a lawsuit, I think the city's decision to open or not open the pool would likely be entitled to discretionary or official immunity. Immunity is absolute – it means the city cannot be held liable. The best way to establish immunity is for the city to document the reasons for its decision in writing. The city might also be entitled to park and recreation immunity.

If immunity does not apply, an injured person would need to prove the city's negligence caused the injury. The city could also argue the defense of assumption of risk, i.e., the person assumes the risk of injury by using the pool.

Overall, I think the risk of legal liability to the city is low if it opens the pool and someone gets injured. Of course, regardless of liability, we want people to be safe. I'd certainly encourage the city to follow safety protocols from the state and federal government.

I know a number of cities are looking at the same pool issues as Foley. I don't know if there is any consensus yet on the decision to open the municipal pool. In Minneapolis, where I live, I know the city has already made a decision not to open the pools this summer. I think most cities, like Foley, are still waiting to make that decision.

I am also copying Julie Jelen, the city's loss control consultant. As the time draws closer to the city's decision, Julie may have some additional information on what other cities are doing.

Good morning Sarah,

I have talked with Katie a bit about these items, and would like to have a couple of requests for the May 5th agenda regarding closures of Penn Street. Both of these ideas are still in development, and depending on the Governor's orders may not be able to happen.

1 - We would like to still honor the school and community tradition of having a "Tractor Day" parade on Friday, May 22. In doing so, our plan would be to have tractors line up along the frontage road of the high school and onto Penn Street. We would then process north along the high school/intermediate school road, turn and go into our fieldhouse parking lot, do a loop and then go back out to the West to Norman Avenue. Tractors would return home from there. We would be able to have cars lined up in the fieldhouse parking lot as well as along the north/south road between our buildings and the athletic fields. We would adhere to social distancing (only members of the household in the vehicle) etc. Our request would be to close Penn Street to non-school traffic (need to let Tractors and parade-attendees in) from approximately 7:00 a.m. - 9:00 a.m. on Friday, May 22 (and possibly a shorter amount of time). We will work with law enforcement (both City and County) regarding traffic flow and safety.

2 - We are still hoping/planning for a graduation ceremony on Saturday, May 30th. Currently, we are exploring a lot of options including a level of "drive-in" graduation similar to what some churches have been doing. We have a small senior class (about 125) and we have over 300 parking spaces in the south lot in front of the high school. We would potentially see some spill over to Penn Street as well as wanting to reduce traffic (and any inappropriate/disruptive acts by individuals driving by) if we chose to hold an outdoor ceremony. Our request would be to close Penn Street to non-graduation traffic from 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 30th. We already contract/schedule to have Officer Vickstrom available during graduation and would continue to utilize him and would work closely with him and Chief McMillan regarding details and safety. We would adhere to social distancing guidelines as laid out by the Governor.

Please let me know if you need more information regarding these or if you would like me available to speak to them or answer questions of the Council during the meeting.

Re: Skills-based Training and Testing Allowed for Firefighters during COVID-19

Today Governor Walz included a clarification in Executive Order 20-33 Critical Sector Descriptions (Extending the Stay at Home Order and Temporary Closure of Bars, Restaurants, and Other Places of Public Accommodation), which states: "Evaluators and fire fighters at skills training, including evaluation for the state's firefighter Certification Testing, where such training and evaluations cannot be given remotely and provided that social distancing and other mitigation strategies are employed."

This clarification allows for firefighters and evaluators to do hands-on training and testing – so long as they can do so while having protocols in place in order to maintain social distancing (identical to the clarification which was added on April 13, 2020 for law enforcement).

The clarification does not mean that fire departments can resume their regularly scheduled meetings, it is only related to skills-based training and certification testing.

Terminating skills-based training and testing was more than likely initiated by your governing body (i.e. City Administrator, City Council, Town Board, etc.); therefore, the decision to resume hands-on training and testing will need to come through them as well.

This clarification to Executive Order 20-33 Critical Sector Descriptions merely gives the fire chief or their designee a means to which a conversation can now take place between the fire department and their governing body to potentially get back to doing hands-on activities, it does not imply that fire departments must return to doing so.

Consent Agenda

The council salaries item is on the agenda. This was approved by council prior and is now in its final ordinance form after being posted on city website. It does not go into effect until 2021, after the election.

Foley Municipal Pool

With the extension of the stay at home it will be more difficult to make a decision on the operation of the pool for the 2020 season. The council and staff will need to discuss this on Tuesday. I did reach out to the League on a couple items, an email summarizing liability concerns is in your packet and staff can provide more detail during the call. Our options are summarized as follows:

- Close the pool for the season. Staff would still have to do some maintenance items so some expense would occur but not nearly to the level on when we open it. We do levy dollars each year to cover the additional costs of the pool and there should be plenty to cover the minimum maintenance. There could be some unemployment issues from staff with the pool closure. Additional unemployment benefits are available due to COVID-19 but some of the federal reimbursements are not all in place with the all of the relief programs so as a caution, we should be mindful of that possibility.
- Move ahead with opening the pool somewhere between June 3rd – 12th. If we move forward, we would also move ahead with a swimming lesson schedule in addition to open swim. I would not recommend proceeding with only open swim as the pool would simply lose too much money as lessons are the most significant revenue source. There will also be additional costs in disinfection/cleaning of public spaces and bathrooms that would need to be worked through based on state guidance. Social distancing protocols are also a possibility. We have reached out to the Department of Health and they are not providing us any specific recommendations yet as the stay at home is still in effect. Even if we open, it's possible our revenues could be affected by people being scared to use the pool or sign up for swim lessons so that is also another item that needs to be considered.

Foley Fun Days - 2020

Juanita Beauchamp, Civic Group Chair, will be on the call to discuss Fun Days and whether the remaining components of the event should continue. The council must give permission to utilize the

streets for the festival, including the carnival and parade. As many of you have seen, a number of festivals have been cancelled and some are still moving forward.

Foley Schools – Tractor Day & Graduation

There is an email in your packet from the high school principal requesting use of city streets for tractor day and a graduation ceremony. Staff has no concerns with the closure of these streets, provided there is not a current stay at home or similar order prohibiting the activity issued by the state. We hope the state provides more guidance on these activities in the near future. Staff also recommends the school contact those properties which have their access off of Penn and develop a plan to ensure they have reasonable access to their properties at all times. If the council chooses to approve, I would recommend they work with the city department heads on the final details of the events.

Public Works Update

Mark will provide an update on the bidding for the Hwy 25 Trail Project, the old lion's park playground and other activities of the public works department.

Fire Training/COVID-19

Mark has asked me to include a letter in your packet regarding some exemptions to the meeting requirements in order to conduct fire training. He will be discussing with council on the call.

Parking Surfaces Enforcement

Staff would like direction on how to proceed with parking surfaces enforcement. We want to be mindful of the current situation before sending out additional enforcement letters by discussing with council first.

COVID-19 – City Operations

We have a number of items to discuss related to COVID-19. They include:

- Utility Bills/Shut-Offs – We pushed back due dates until June 30th. Do we still want to wait to conduct a shut off? Does the council intend to waive penalties after the June 30th due date?
- City Hall Re-opening – Public works will be installing a plexiglass guard to the city counter in the coming weeks to prepare for the process of re-opening or allowing some interaction with the public. We have found that conducting business online, via phone, email, mail has been very effective and we have been able to achieve the majority of tasks. We have made reasonable accommodations when these solutions do not work. The teleworking and remote services has gone much better than I even imagined. With that being said, we do look forward to re-opening. When we move forward, I have a few recommendations. For instance, we could start by appointment basis only, then move to limited hours, with a final transition to regular hours. Our plan would also need to be mindful of the library. My conversations with them indicate they will re-open at a much slower pace than other entities. I'd like to have some council feedback on this item so I can incorporate this into a plan we all feel will be successful.
- Budget Operations – I would like some direction from the council on how to proceed with budget operations in the current year. I have asked department heads to hold off on any significant capital purchases at this time for a number of reasons:
 - The county is considering adopting a policy waiving a significant portion of penalties for those who do not pay their property taxes on time. I'm not sure how that will affect our budget and assessment collections and it's possible it will have minimal impact. I

however, need to remind the council that 57% of our general budget is dependent on property tax collection. We also have significant assessment payments which are due. Those assessments are used to help make bond payments along with taxes. If the property tax and assessment revenues are reduced, we will need to utilize other cash to make payments and sustain operations.

- A significant amount of cash has or will already be flowing out of the city this year. These include a fire truck, plow truck, the trail project and some other smaller items that we have already committed to. We do have good cash reserves but some are necessary to maintain a bond rating and could also be used to pay for any shortfall. I will note that closing the pool would help this situation as extra funds would likely be available as we levy additional dollars to the pool every year.

Wastewater Update

We had a great conference call with the governor's office this past week and are continuing our push before the end of the session. Mark is also able to answer any questions you have regarding the current ponds and their operation.

Open Forum

Again, no open forum on the agenda and it is not required. Please encourage anyone who wishes to submit anything to do so in writing and I will get it sent out to all members.
